Learn about Meredydd Evans and his work to collect Welsh traditional music at the St. David's luncheon, and sing some, too

The St. David's Society of Minnesota will celebrate the work of Mereddyd Evans at the Annual Banquet in March. We will remember Evans, who died in 2015, at the age of 95, and learn about his work as a collector, editor, historian and notable performer of folk music.

Evans was also politically active, and led the revival of the Welsh language through the Cymdeithas movement, a campaign for the Welsh language and communities in Wales, and for the worldwide struggle for minority rights and freedoms.

We'll hear some of the songs Meredydd Evans popularized, and special guest Kai Featherstone, a musician and native of Wales, will lead us in a chorus or two. We'll also highlight the work of Evans's wife, Phyllis Kinney, in researching traditional Welsh music.

Top 10 Unusual Things About St. David

- 1. He was born during a thunderstorm, and the rock where his mother was lying was split in two at the moment of his birth.
- 2. St. Patrick may have been born in the same spot.
- He was from an aristocratic family, and King Arthur may have been his great-uncle on his mother's side.
- 4. He was baptized by St. Elvis.
- 5. He was over 100 years old when he died, on 1 March around AD 590. Life expectancy for men around that time was probably around 35.
- 6. Once during his travels, he was preaching to a large crowd at Llanddewi Brefi, many of whom complained that they couldn't see him. He spread a handkerchief on the ground and stood on it, and the ground beneath rose up to give him an instant podium.
- 7. St. David is said to have cured several people of blindness, including his teacher.
- 8. He was a vegetarian and teetotaler, and believed in hard physical work for himself and his monks. This made him so unpopular that there was a plot at one of the monasteries to feed him poisoned bread. When warned about this, St. David blessed the bread and ate it—and lived to tell the tale!
- More churches were dedicated to him than to any other Welsh saint, leading to him being adopted as Wales' patron saint.
- 10. His shrine in St. David's Cathedral was considered very holy. If you were a pilgrim, four visits to his shrine were equal to two to Rome or one to Jerusalem.

Well-Read Dragons look next at two very different titles

On Saturday, Feb. 4, the book group will "meet" a man who has been called "the greatest Welshman of our time."

Presenting Saunders Lewis, ed. by Alun R. Jones and Gwyn Thomas, includes a celebratory poem by R.S. Thomas another modern-day writer the group "met."

Twentieth-century Wales would have been very different without Saunders Lewis. He was a Welsh poet, dramatist, historian, literary critic, and political activist. He was a prominent Welsh nationalist and a founder of Plaid Genedlaethol Cymru, later known as Plaid Cymru. ["Vote Wales" in literal translation.]

The book includes personal views of Lewis and his work by representatives of three generations; as well as many examples of his writing: eight essays (seven of which were originally written in English); 18 poems; and three plays (two of which are in verse).

Lewis died in 1985 at age 91.

Discussion is sure to be thoughtful that day. Likely many in the group will be wishing they were able to read his original work in Welsh.

Then, for a complete change of pace, the group will look at a modern farce—on **April Fool's Day!** *The Land of My Neighbors* by Barry Pilton is a comedic take-off on the first words of the Welsh national anthem, "Land of my Fathers."

Discussion that day is, of course, bound to be full of good fun.

Both of these books are available at Twin City libraries and on MnLINK, which helps one search all Minnesota libraries. Both are also available at AbeBooks and Amazon.

Vern Drilling

In the early hours on Thanksgiving Day, 2016, Vern Drilling died. He was 79. Perhaps God remembered that Vern's mother, who was such an influence in his life, had also died Thanksgiving Day and felt it appropriate.

Anyone who knew Vern knew that he grew up in Iowa and always remained a loyal Iowan in spite of living most of his adult life in Minnesota. He had a good childhood even though his family was very poor. Upon graduating from high school he sought resources that would allow him to attend college only to be told that poor kids like him didn't go to college. Fortunately he didn't give up and he would ultimately go on to earn his PhD from the University of Minnesota.

He was a writer and his book *Closing Doors, Opening Worlds* influenced many lives. His travel for work and for personal curiosity took him to 59 countries. It also fit very well with his interest in history and languages.

From his early years, music played an important part in his life. One of his greatest joys was playing the piano in assisted living homes and memory loss facilities. He always looked forward to singing with various choirs and music groups and took special pleasure in singing with the Welsh.

Diseases such as Alzheimer's and Parkinson's are very frightening and it is a sad reality of our society that we distance ourselves from those who suffer from these afflictions. Vern was fortunate to have people around him and he always had a smile for everyone.

Vern and his smile will be greatly missed.

He was a proud graduate of Thomas Lowry grade school, University High, and the University of Minnesota (SLA and Library School). He worked at Hastings State Hospital; as a Minneapolis police officer, 1961–1965; head librarian, Hopkins Public Library; and Honeywell corporate research librarian. He served in the U.S. Army Reserve Medical Corps.

He is survived by his wife Audrey, sons Michael and John, daughters-in-law Anita and Carla, grandson Aaran. He is also survived by his twin brother Tom and family. Mike was predeceased by his parents, Mac and Merneva, brother Steve, sisters-in-law Emelie and Joan, parents-in-law Inda and Edgar Phillips, and brother-in-law Jack.

Heather Mavis Owen, 91, of Lakeville, Minn., died November 3, 2016. She was a former longtime member of the Society. She was preceded in death by her husband the Rev. David Owen, to whom she was married for 59 years.

Heather's life was full of adventure and accomplishment. A native of England, she weathered the Battle of Britain in London as a girl and teenager. She attended the London College of Music, where she became an excellent classical pianist and vocalist—gifts that made her a lifelong teacher of piano. Her numberless University and private students included several of her own grandchildren, and she was still teaching piano this year.

After marrying David and giving birth to her their two sons in Great Britain, the couple moved to the United States, where Heather taught music at the University of Wisconsin-Madison; gave birth to two more sons; and taught at North Central University in Minneapolis.

She and David travelled extensively, teaching and ministering in the U.K., Europe, Asia, Africa, Australia, and North America. Heather was the embodiment of a "lady." She was often seen in a dress and pearls, and carried herself with a sort of refined disposition that exuded a naturally selfless confidence.

Heather loved learning and discovery, and was still contemplating theological mysteries until her last day on this earth. Many an afternoon were spent around her dining room table over authentic English tea and Scottish shortbread or scones, while discussing everything from the latest book she had read to the most complex theology.

She had a witty sense of humor and took great delight in inventing and retelling jokes, and puns, and was always a joy to sit and talk with. She was a woman of many talents. She published several books of poetry, was a sought-after speaker, teacher, vocalist, and musician. She had a great ear for harmony and could make her baby grand piano sing. In a word, Heather was lovely.

Heather dearly loved her husband and adored her four boys and extended family. She was steadfast in her pursuit to know the loving character of God more deeply, and her spirit reflected a stillness and assuredness rooted in that faith. Her exemplary life leaves a legacy of wisdom and ultimate hope in "the restoration of all things." Heather, in all of her grace and beauty, will be deeply missed.

Heather is survived by her four sons, Kendal (Sally), Colin (Marge), Bill (Sherry), Dave (Diana), 12 grandchildren, 19 great-grandchildren, one great-great grandchild, sister Hazel Wiltshire of London, U.K., and countless friends all over the world.

Her funeral service was held Nov. 9, 2016, at Hosanna! Church in Lakeville, Minn.

Anglesey Blue

First in New Series of Compelling Crime Novels

OAKLAND, CALIF., Sept. 30, 2016 – *Anglesey Blue* is the first in a new series of crime novels featuring sharp-witted, but troubled detective, DI Tudor Manx, a cigar smoking, hard-drinking policeman with a dark past and an uncertain future.

Anglesey Blue was written by Dylan H. Jones, originally from the Isle of Anglesey in northwest Wales, who now lives in Oakland, California. Jones is a successful, award-winning media executive and copywriter. However, eager to paint onto a larger canvas, Jones tapped into his storytelling expertise to create the compelling and complex character DI Tudor Manx in his debut book, Anglesey Blue, which was inspired by his love of crime fiction, the dark landscape of Wales and his life experience both on and off the island.

Anglesey Blue is set on the picturesque Welsh Island of Anglesey. The usually peaceful haven is shaken to its core when a brutally mutilated body is found crucified on the bow of a fishing boat. Is it a message or a premonition of more murders to come?

Detective Inspector Tudor Manx is assigned to the case — his first murder investigation since being transferred from London to the North Wales Constabulary. Not averse to bruising a few egos, Manx's gruff impatience grates with the local community and his superiors.

Facing pressure to solve the case quickly and wrestling with the demons of his past, Manx's world is turned upside down by a startling revelation in the closing hours of the investigation: one that forces him to choose between his family and his duty as a police officer.
